The paper posits that in environments with limited physicians, like Canada, fee-for-service payment models can lead to efficient care delivery as physicians are not pressured to over-provide services. It indicates that this model minimizes financial risks for doctors compared to capitation models, which can encourage group practices to mitigate individual risk.

The author advocates for reevaluating fee-for-service systems, particularly in underserved areas, to ensure physicians are compensated fairly for their work. It concludes by stressing the importance of understanding risk-sharing in healthcare and determining the level of care that effectively meets public health needs while encouraging sustainable physician practices.
