The speaker references a paper they wrote upon invitation from a Brazilian journal, aiming to contribute to discussions about these topics, which are prevalent in both Brazil and globally.

The speaker indicates that a significant body of literature exists but often focuses on failures rather than democratic engagement. They note that despite technological advancements, many people, including those in developed countries, still lack access to safe water, highlighting that the problem is not merely one of resources, but one of political will and decision-making.
