For example, many migrants were unable to own property or participate directly in government yet created professional associations to circumvent limitations and advocate for their rights.

Zeno, the founder of Stoicism and an immigrant from Cyprus, serves as a case study illustrating these points. Despite facing discrimination, Zeno and other migrants significantly influenced the societies in which they lived, affecting culture, religion, and politics. The author concludes that ancient Greek society was likely shaped by migrants' contributions, challenging traditional views that idealize Greek culture as purely homogenous.
