The speaker argues that law clinics are well-positioned to challenge these dynamics by fostering radical change and engaging communities in advocacy efforts. By setting ambitious goals for reform and cultivating innovative solutions, law clinics can help shift the focus from incremental improvements to transformative changes in immigration policy. They should also educate students about the limitations of incrementalism and encourage critical perspectives on conventional reform efforts.

Ultimately, while systemic change is recognized as difficult and uncertain, the speaker emphasizes the importance of planting seeds for future reform, urging advocates to adopt a more imaginative approach to the U.S. immigration system and recognize the potential for similar critiques in other areas of law.
