This database includes over a thousand rules on various policies like work requirements and asset limits, aimed at providing valuable information for researchers and policymakers.
2. **Variation Among States**: The speaker observed significant variation in welfare policies across different states and hypothesized a relationship between these policies and the influence of interest groups, noting that many welfare rules seem arbitrary and may not reflect the actual needs of welfare recipients.
