In sum, the research asserts that Reagan's influence reshaped not only the Republican Party by merging traditional conservatism with religious elements but also elevated the religious right as a significant political force, laying the groundwork for future mobilizations and policy considerations that echoed through the decades, culminating in notable events like the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*. The author argues that Reagan's normalization of religious involvement in politics had a lasting impact that has yet to be fully acknowledged in academic literature.
