3. ****Partisanship and Bipartisan Appeals****: The research indicated that while bipartisan support was effective in boosting Democrat support for aid, it did not impact Republicans significantly due to divisions within the Republican Party regarding aid to Ukraine.
4. ****Foreign Aid Popularity and Misconceptions****: Despite foreign aid being generally unpopular among Americans, support for aid to Ukraine remained relatively high across Democrats and Republicans, likely due to misconceptions about the scale of foreign aid and its perceived importance.
5. ****Impact of Current Events****: The ongoing Gaza War has shifted public attention away from the issue of aid to Ukraine, potentially harming support for Ukraine as the media coverage of other conflicts diverts attention and reduces the focus on Ukraine-related issues.
