The speaker also underscores the need for transparency and data collection regarding the imposition and collection of these debts to enhance understanding and guide policy changes. Overall, they advocate for a fairer system that holds individuals accountable without economically crippling them, suggesting deeper systemic reforms to ensure justice is equally accessible to all citizens.
